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#### Community Systems and Implementation of Community Health Policies at Scale

Community engagement is one of the nine action areas highlighted to support the achievement of the new Global Strategy for Women's, Children's, and Adolescents' Health goals. Community-based health programs are identified as key drivers for reducing health inequality and accelerating progress to end preventable maternal and child deaths. The global policy landscape for community health has changed, with new policies for community health that position community resources within a systems context. In acknowledgement of the growing policy momentum and evidence base for community health, the plenaries set the stage for a common understanding of the opportunities, challenges, and key lessons relevant for developing a holistic community health systems approach that can be sustained and scaled up. The concurrent sessions showcase evidence and country experiences for a broad range of approaches that engage and empower communities as resources in systems; identify missed opportunities and lessons to strengthen, sustain, and scale up these approaches within a health delivery and community systems context; and recognize the community health workforce as a critical component linking health service delivery and community systems.

#### Sustainable Financing for Community Health

Sustainable financing to strengthen community health systems is a key driver for successfully institutionalizing community health to achieve and sustain effective coverage at scale. Yet it remains unrealized in many countries. The plenary focuses on the challenges and opportunities in the current financing landscape, through active debate with country representatives and donors. Break-out sessions will: discuss how financing challenges faced by CHW programs can be addressed through existing and new financing sources, operational enablers, and political prioritization; showcase a country that has developed a long-term financial plan to introduce and scale up a CHW program; introduce a systems focus in community health planning and costing; the role of result-based financing programs in community engagement; and, lessons from the expansion and scale-up of community-based financing.

### **Equity and Accountability**

The SDGs reinforce the grand convergence in health, in which women and children in the poorest communities have the same access to quality health services as those in the wealthiest. With a renewed emphasis on equitable access to health care, we can save 8 million lives in the poorest 40 percent of the population. A pro-equity approach is more effective and cost-effective than mainstream approaches and includes community engagement and empowerment. Sessions will showcase the EQUitable Impact Sensitive Tool (EQUIST) and its country-based applications; link EQUIST modelling to evidence-based community approaches that promote equity and accountability, including gendersensitive approaches; and, describe equity-sensitive and community-focused monitoring and evaluation.
